A stroll through **Chinatown** provides a cornucopia of sights for the visitor. Lined with grocers, fishmongers, tea sellers, herbalists, noodle parlors, and temples, there is something for everyone. The **Exploratorium** is an experimental, hands-on museum designed to spark curiosity – regardless of your age or familiarity with science. Golden Gate Park is a crucial (and relaxing) part of the San Francisco experience. Top sights are the Conservatory of Flowers, Japanese Tea Garden and the fabulous new De Young Museum. Ghirardelli Square is a National Historic Landmark property that dates from 1864, when it served as a factory making Civil War uniforms, but it's best known as the former chocolate and spice factory of Domingo Ghirardelli who purchased it in 1893. The chocolate factory is no longer located at this location, instead it is a rather unimpressive three level mall containing 30 plus stores. But if you have a sweet tooth, you won't be disappointed at the mall's fantastic old-fashioned soda fountain. For more information visit www.ghirardellisq.com

Muir Woods is unlike any other forest in the world and an experience you won't soon forget. A mere 6 miles from San Francisco (as the crow flies), view the magnificent California redwoods including the *Sequoia sempervirens*, the tallest living thing known to man! Afterwards visit the eclectic little town of **Sausalito**, a slightly bohemian, nonchalant, studiously quaint, also across the bay from San Francisco.
